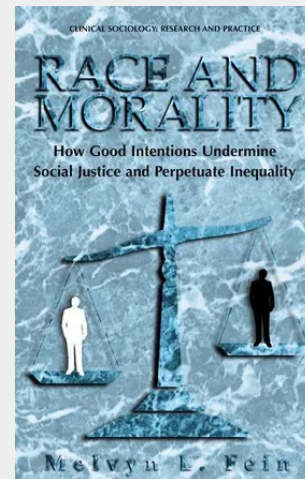


Race and Morality
