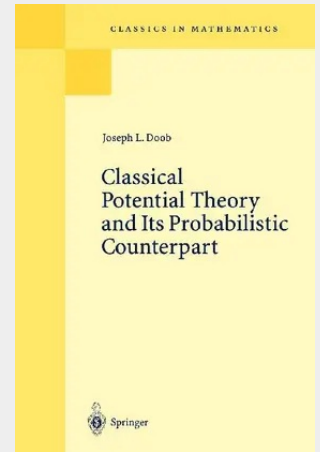


Classical Potential Theory and Its Probabilistic Counterpart
